## VIOLENCE IS PREVENTABLE GIRLS PROGRAM KICKS OFF NEW GROUP

February 2006 marked the beginning of a new era for HYP's Violence is Preventable Girls Program (VIP). A new group of seven young women, ages 11 to 17, began meeting on February 16 to discuss the impact that violence has had on their lives.

**VIP offers leadership opportunities, resources and other opportunities for the participants including peer support, case management, creative arts and special needs scholarships.**

Using curriculum created by current VIP Coordinator Karla Robinson and youth staff Christina Calloway and Stephanie Angeles, the group participates in community building activities that encourage them to be supportive of one another

in a non-competitive, safe and open environment.

These dynamic young women will meet every Tuesday and Thursday for 13 weeks at HYP's Cole Street Clinic in San Francisco, to discuss maintaining healthy relationships, self-care, sex education and various topics with an "anti-oppression" focus.

The group will also work together on a community project that will allow them to express their viewpoints on preventing violence to the public. Through collaboration on a community project, new bonds are created. "We are more than just strangers in a group," one young woman explains, "at these meetings, new friendships are formed."

## NEW YOUTH GROUP COMMITTED TO LEADERSHIP IN MARIN

Building youth leadership within Marin's Latino Community is an important aspect of the latest group formed by Huckleberry Teen Health Program. The Youth Leaders in Progress (YLIP) group is celebrating its first year in existence with 13 young Latino participants (8 young women, 5 young men). The group will meet once a week through the summer to participate in extensive trainings facilitated by Health Educators, Annette Lombardi and Daniel Solis. The training curriculum ranges from pregnancy and HIV prevention to eating disorders and drug and alcohol prevention education.

After completing the trainings, these youth will participate in community outreach with the possibility of later being recruited as HYP Peer Health Educators. "These young people are primarily non-traditional leaders, young people whom, in a largely white, affluent county, face enormous challenges in feeling empowered," says Ami Ehrlich, Health Education Coordinator. "The purpose of this group is to allow them to find their own voice within a safe and structured environment and openly explore their interests."

The group is currently conducting community outreach at least twice a month, sharing what they have learned in YLIP with other young people in the community.

## HYP MAKES A DIFFERENCE

### MELISSA'S STORY

Melissa\* was brought into HYP's Community Assessment and Referral Center (CARC) after being charged with petty theft. At fifteen years old, she was struggling to make it through the ninth grade and had little communication with her mother. Upon her arrival at CARC, she was enrolled in Theft Awareness Class and offered counseling to help her improve her relationship with her mom.

Melissa completed the class and began to meet with a therapist from Huckleberry's counseling program once a week. Her relationship with her mother, as well as her grades, improved over the course of a few months. Her case at CARC was subsequently closed. Things took a turn for the worse, however, when Melissa was rearrested.

Melissa was assigned community service and she and her mother continued to see an HYP therapist. The counseling sessions eventually allowed Melissa to become more open and learn new behavior that would help her better deal with her anger, before it got her into greater trouble. The HYP therapist referred her to Anger Management classes at the Youth Guidance Center, which helped

her improve her behavior as well as her relationship with her mom.

Since successfully completing the Anger Management classes and receiving the proper encouragement from the HYP staff, Melissa has gone on to earn her high school diploma and is successfully employed.

## PEER HEALTH EDUCATOR SPOTLIGHT:

### DAVID DALPINO

For the past two years, twenty-one year old Peer Health Educator (PHE) David Dalpino has been an amazing asset to the team at Huckleberry Teen Health Program (HTHP) in Marin.

As a PHE, David provides waiting-

room education on HIV, STIs and pregnancy prevention to clients during clinic hours. He also conducts street outreach and co-facilitates groups and workshops for HTHP.

David already had experience as a youth leader and advocate prior to joining the Huckleberry team. As a high school student, he became involved in community work and helped run the Gay Straight Alliance at his high school.

During his tenure at Huckleberry, David has been on the planning committee for the annual Prevention Pavilion at the Marin County Fair, where he has been instrumental in creating a fun and safe environment for teens

and families to learn about healthy lifestyles. His supervisor, Ami Ehrlich, Health Education Coordinator, felt so strongly about David's abilities as a PHE, she promoted him to the Lead PHE position. "David started at Huckleberry with great skills and experience," says Ami, "and he has continued to grow and challenge himself at every level. Best of all, he reminds me every day not to take myself too seriously." Ami also recently nominated David for the Western States Youth Services Network *Empowering Our Peers Youth Award*, for which he received an Honorable Mention.





## HYP COUNSELING PROGRAM EXTENDED TO TWO LOCAL SCHOOLS

By maintaining successful collaborations and community-wide partnerships, HYP continues to offer services free of charge to as many local youth as possible. Our latest community partnership is with two San Francisco public schools - Wallenberg High School and Aim High Academy, a local middle school.

Staff at Huckleberry House noticed that many clients at the shelter, as well as in the Counseling Program, were students of Wallenberg High and Aim High Academy. HYP Director of



Mental Health Programs, Jorge Vega, responded to this obvious need for intervention by offering counseling services in these schools, both of which are in close proximity to Huckleberry House.

Starting in November 2005, HYP therapist, Jane Margulis, began seeing students every week on Wallenberg's campus during regular school hours. Therapist Saun-Toy Trotter began seeing students at Aim High Academy in February 2006. "The idea of going into the school is to remove the access barrier," says Jorge. "Because of time

restraints, working families don't have the motivation to get to counseling."

If the program continues to thrive at Wallenberg and Aim High, Huckleberry Youth Programs hopes to offer in-school services to more youth. Currently, only Medi-Cal clients are being offered counseling services, while other students are referred directly to HYP. The goal of the program is to eventually offer the services to non-Medi-Cal clients and introduce different modalities, such as group therapy at the school sites.

## COMING SOON: NOVATO WELLNESS CENTER

Opening this summer, The Novato Wellness Center (NWC) will be the first major health services center for teens in the Novato area and is scheduled to be located on Grant Avenue. The NWC is a collaboration of Planned Parenthood Golden Gate, the Novato Youth Center, Bay Area Community Resources and Huckleberry Teen Health Program. This group of organizations is known as the Novato Youth Wellness Collaborative, and HYP is a founding member.

The NWC will provide a weekly drop in health clinic targeting low-income

youth, ages 12 to 20, and it will include a bilingual and bicultural youth and adult staff. Reproductive health services, case management, mental health services and drug and alcohol counseling will be offered.

Maintaining youth involvement will also be a major priority of the NWC. "Youth will be involved at every level - as decision makers, as service providers and as clients," says Susan Quigley, HYP's Associate Director, Marin Programs. Youth will be incorporated into every facet of the clinic from outreach and registration, to delivery and evaluation of services.

## PARENTS AND TEENS SHARE THEIR THOUGHTS ABOUT NINE GROVE LANE

HYP's Nine Grove Lane has been the only 24-hour temporary shelter in Marin County for over 30 years. Offering a safe environment for homeless youth, as well as family reunification therapy, Nine Grove Lane's goal is to improve lives and reduce conflict in the home. 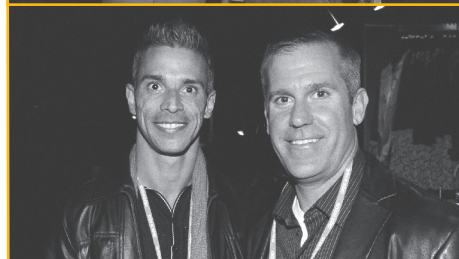

"I really like my job at HYP because it allows me the opportunity for growth and diversity," says Veronica. She also enjoys working with the CRECER (To Grow) Program, a program for young mothers that provides them with free car seats, strollers and parenting education. "Even in the most difficult circumstances, Veronica remains calm, supportive and non-judgmental," says Ami Ehrlich. "She shows us all that teaching is about listening just as much as it is about talking."

The co-recipient of the Danny Keenan Award, Blair Morgan, began her three and a half years at HYP as an intern while studying Psychology at USF. The staff at Huckleberry House was so impressed with Blair's passion for working with youth she was hired as a full-time Residential Counselor after receiving her Bachelor's degree. "I really think there should be more places like Huckleberry House so kids have a place to take a break and feel safe. I think it's really special," says Blair.

### The Audrey Chickering Award

Established in 2000, The Audrey Chickering Leadership Award recognizes Audrey Chickering's exemplary work and commitment to the development of HYP. Audrey provided support and leadership to HYP for many years, including playing a decisive role in the campaign to purchase Huckleberry House. This award is presented annually to a staff member who has shown outstanding leadership and commitment to the health, growth and continuation of HYP.

### The Danny Keenan Award

was created in 1992 after his death from AIDS to honor Danny's dedication to serving at-risk and runaway youth in San Francisco. As an HYP employee, Danny's leadership was instrumental in the establishment and success of the Teen HIV Prevention Program, which continues today as the Cole Street Clinic. This award is given annually to an HYP staff member for outstanding dedication.
